classes available to the public. But I believe that my favorite feature of the library is the many direct and indirect connections it has with our local schools.

My elementary, middle, and high school children have been intellectually and academically nurtured through a wide range of programs and activities offered at the Sewickley Public Library. In recent years, they have participated in the Battle of the Books, the National Novel Writing Month (www.nanowrimo.org), the Young Writers Group, Booked for Lunch (a literature club for middle and high school students), and the Summer Reading Program(s).

Many of these events are advertised through the schools and open to interested students. Some activities, however, are more

directly related to the formal educational experiences of the kids. Last spring, for instance, my daughter completed her 10th grade project as a required component of the Quaker Valley curriculum. In an effort to blend her loves of literature and sewing, she read four culturally iconic novels from different historical periods— Wuthering Heights, Pride and Prejudice, Gone with the Wind, and The Great Gatsby—and then created period-accurate dresses for the heroines, Catherine Earnshaw, Elizabeth Bennet, Scarlett O'Hara, and Daisy Buchanon. Library Director Carolyn Toth met with my daughter to discuss the project and was pleased to display the exhibit for the benefit of my child, her assignment, the school district, and library patrons.

The library has also displayed my other children's artwork, conveying to them (and their classmates, who have also had art exhibited at the library) that their artistic endeavors are worth sharing with the world, beginning with the people they see, know, and respect at the library.

The Sewickley Public Library works very intentionally to encourage our children's intellectual and cultural development, offering a support system for their academic pursuits as well as a safe place for them to be

creative as writers and artists. Thank you teen librarian, Emily Fear, director Carolyn Toth, other staff and volunteers, and the Quaker Valley School District for instilling in them a love of reading, writing, and the creative arts—and a growing passion for lifelong learning.


### **Special Thanks for Many More Unique Donations**




